Students at WSD high schools now have the opportunity to take a class quickly becoming known as Chromebook Repair Class (or CSI Chrome Lab). As the WSD has moved toward a one-to-one student-to-device ratio, basic troubleshooting with the devices is now being taken on by a select group of students at each school as part of a technology class. This is the type of experiential learning that not just gives students hands-on learning in fixing the devices, but also customer service experience in conferring with their clients and returning the fixed devices. Through an authentic technology service center at our high schools, this course allows students to develop and apply technical knowledge and soft skills. Soft skills include communication, customer service, problem solving, decision making, time management and working on a team. New WSD High School



In December, 2018, the WSD Board of Education approved hiring Wright Construction to build the District's new high school in the amount of \$74.6 million. The Board also approved Karrenbrock Construction to perform the work outlined in the Site Package in the amount of \$1.7 million. The new high school, which was approved by voters last April as part of Proposition E, will be built on land the District owns near the intersection of N. Point Prairie and West Meyer Road in Wentzville. It is scheduled to open for the 2021-22 school year.
