Timberland Student Named National Merit Scholarship Program Semifinalist



The WSD is proud to announce that Timberland senior Logan Brenningmeyer has been selected as a semifinalist in the 65th Annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Semifinalists represent less than 1% of U.S. high school seniors, and have the opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million. Eight more WSD students earned Commended Student status, as well.

Brenningmeyer has a GPA of 4.47 and earned a composite score of 35 on the ACT. He has attended Missouri Scholars Academy, Missouri Boys State, and is a member of the National Honor Society. Brenningmeyer also works well within a team, as a member of the school band in his freshman and sophomore years, DECA his junior and senior years, and he has played for the tennis team through all four years. Brenningmeyer has an interest in graphic design, enjoys video games, and he is starting a clothing company with a friend in his spare time. An avid music lover, as well, he plays the saxophone and piano, and is currently learning the guitar. Brenningmeyer is applying to Northwestern and The University of Chicago, and is considering studying business or computer science.

The WSD had several students reach National Merit Commended designation, and they'll receive Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise. Some of these students will become candidates for special scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses. Those students are Sean Oswald from Timberland High School; Rodney Jenkins, Madeline Jennings, Amaya Kopp, Hannah Reeb, and Cora Sverdrup from Holt High School; and Alexis Bentley and Nawal Cheema from Liberty High School. WSD Hires Principal for New Elementary School



The WSD has named Dr. Candice Belton as the principal for the new elementary school, opening next fall for the 2020-21 school year. Dr. Belton is currently serving as an assistant principal at Boone Trail Elementary, after coming to the WSD in 2017 from the Hazelwood School District, and has over 15 years of teaching and administrative experience. The new school is being constructed on Interstate Drive off South Point Prairie Road in Wentzville.

Since starting with the District, Dr. Belton has been a member of the CSIP Steering Committee, the Flexible Learning Cohort, and she is currently participating in the Missouri Leadership Development System. Dr. Belton has her doctoral degree in Teacher Leadership from Maryville University, her master's degree in Educational Leadership from the University of Missouri-St. Louis, and her Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education from UMSL.

"I am so honored to have the opportunity to serve as the lead learner as we open our newest elementary school," said Belton. "My commitment to this community began over 30 years ago when I was a student in the Wentzville School District. 

Second Letter to Parents – ASIRT Training

Dear WSD Parents and Guardians,

In our efforts to be vigilant and proactive with regard to school safety, we provided options-based Active Intruder Training for all employees in the Wentzville School District during August and September. This is a continuation of the training timeline based on recommendations from our School Safety Committee.


The District has a team of certified trainers who have been trained by Tier One Tactical Solutions to provide the instruction, which includes protocols based on recommendations from the U.S. Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. These agencies recommend that all school districts teach staff and students options (education, evade, escape and engage) that may be available to them in an intruder situation. Last spring, our school nurses provided first aid training for all employees as well. Our timeline does include training for students from October through May this school year. WSD staff will lead discussions with all students. Students in preK-2 will discuss “educate, evade, and escape” while students in grades 3-12 will also discuss what it means to “engage.” [Tips for Parents](#) provides more detail about the 4E program as well as frequently asked questions.



Additional recommendations by the School Safety Committee that have already been implemented in our schools include: posted information in all rooms to help first responders quickly identify locations, and contact information next to all phones for how to reach emergency personnel, school resource officers and the school nurse.

We will continue to work closely with our local law enforcement agencies to stay abreast of the latest recommendations as it relates to active intruder situations. Please be assured that the Wentzville School District has the safety and welfare of our students in mind at all times. We will work together to make sure that our procedures for preventing and dealing with dangerous situations such as an intruder are as effective as possible, and that our children are protected. The more we work together with students, parents, staff, community members and law enforcement, the stronger and safer we are as a community.


District Enrollment Continues to Grow



The official September enrollment count is in, and the Wentzville School District has added 540 new students since last year! WSD Students Plant Pinwheels for Peace



Members of the Timberland High School Art Club planted almost 2,000 pinwheels around the exterior of their school in recognition of International Day of Peace. The pinwheels were created by Timberland students, staff and families in conjunction with “Pinwheels for Peace,” a project that was initiated in 2005 by two art teachers in Florida as a way for students to express how they felt about what was going on in the world around them. Timberland art students have participated in the project for the past 12 years. Timberland Art Club students work under the instruction of Fine Arts Department Chair Crystal Wing. “Art Club is overwhelmed by the school support in this project,” shared Wing. “Classes have made amazing pinwheels representing peace, and they’ve shared them with siblings and community groups. This project brings everyone together for a message so important to us all.”

Last year, Pinwheels for Peace organizers estimated over 4.5 million pinwheels were displayed worldwide on the same day in multiple countries. “In today’s world, peace needs to be more than just a word,” is the motto shared on [the project website](#).

International Walk to School Day



Students from Green Tree Elementary and Heritage Primary joined schools around the world to celebrate the 23rd annual International Walk to School Day on October 2. That morning, nearly 100 Heritage Primary students, parents and staff walked safely from Fireman's Park on West Pearce Boulevard to their school, escorted by officers from the Wentzville Police Department. Then on October 3, a group numbering more than 300 Green Tree students, staff, and families, walked to school from Boulevard Park, escorted by the Lake St. Louis Police Department.

This marks the 10th anniversary for Green Tree partnering with the Lake Saint Louis Police Department to celebrate International Walk to School Day. Lake St. Louis Community Resource and D.A.R.E. Officer Susan Ochs has helped to organize the walk every year and are happy that this event has become a tradition. "This is a great event to bring the community together, build school spirit, and encourage our students to be safe," Officer Ochs said. WSD Schools Raise \$73K for AHA



Schools in the WSD raised over \$73,000 last year for the American Heart Association, the sixth-most in the state, thanks to students in nine of its schools who held fundraisers over the course of the school year, including Kids Heart Challenge (formerly known as Jump Rope for Heart), American Heart Challenge (formerly known as Dodgeball for Heart) and Wear Red for Heart. According to the AHA, this means the WSD helped save thousands of lives right in our own area. Funds raised for the AHA go toward research, education and medication to fight heart disease in Missouri. The participating schools also received over \$6,150 in vouchers that they can use to purchase physical education equipment through the program. By participating in the various fundraisers, students learned how to take care of their own hearts, as well as how fulfilling it can be to show your heart in helping others in need.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Discovery Ridge Elementary alone raised over \$21,000 in their Kids Heart Challenge campaign, ranking them in the top 10 of all Kids Heart Challenge campaigns in the state of Missouri, and the highest in the WSD. Their generosity earned nearly \$2,000 worth of PE equipment. Duello Elementary, last year's highest fundraiser, followed close behind with over \$18,000 in donations. Wabash Elementary raised more than \$12,000, with Green Tree, Lakeview, and Prairie View elementary schools all raising over \$5,000. Schools in the WSD have been raising funds for the AHA for more than 20 years. Over the last six years, WSD schools have collectively raised over \$490,000 for the AHA.




2019 WSD Homecoming Parade

Eagle Scout Improves Entrance to Heritage Intermediate

Service and leadership are tenets that every scout wants to exhibit. Collin Hudgens (pictured far right), a senior at Holt High and Life Rank Scout with Boy Scout Troop 853 embodied those qualities with his Eagle Scout Project, by improving a walkway at Heritage Intermediate. Mud had been tracked in on shoes due to the walkway between the Heritage campus playground and the Heritage Intermediate doors not having enough pavement. Hudgens figured that since his father was a bricklayer that this was the perfect project to help others while being able to spend more time with his dad. After months of planning, and garnering approval from the BSA Eagle Board, Hudgens and his crew of helpers added two paver stone semicircles (one on each side) to the existing 15-foot pathway. "Several scouts, leaders, parents and friends came out to help make this happen," Hudgens said. "We first had to dig down about 7.5 inches to make a base. Next, four inches of crushed rock was added and tamped down to ensure there were no air pockets. We then filled in with an inch of sand and laid the paver stones on top. My dad (Don Hudgens) made the cuts to the stones to give it the curved semi-circle look. We finished with putting polymeric sand over the stones and then hosing them off to give it its nice, finished look. I'd like to thank Dr. Kraft for this great opportunity and everyone who came out to help that allowed me to finish my Eagle Project and bring me one step closer to accomplishing my goal of Eagle Scout." Hudgens actually started his scouting career in first grade at Peine Ridge Elementary with Pack 993, but is helping a school in the WSD with a more pressing need; showing us that we are truly one District. Only 4% of all members of the Boy Scouts of America earn their Eagle Scout badge.




Late Start Information


